Introduction





The ASP is a three-week credit-based program offering innovative perspectives on Asia. Participating students experience a highly international environment, allowing them to learn directly about the diverse cultures of Asia.

Many of the participating universities send leading professors to offer courses on relevant issues in Asia. Each of the courses taken may be applied toward a student's graduation requirements at his or her home university based on an agreement for credit transfer between the participating universities.

Background

The ASP began through a shared sense of responsibility felt by leaders of the five founding universities: Bangkok University, Thailand; Dongseo University, Korea; Josai University, Japan; Petra Christian University, Indonesia: and Universiti Malaysia Perlis, Malaysia.

It was agreed that given the increasing global importance of Asia, institutions of higher education should strive to create future leaders with a strong understanding of Asian perspectives.

AUPF Affiliation

The Asia Summer Program became an officially ratified affiliate of the Asian University Presidents Forum in 2013, when the 12th annual AUPF was held at University of Malaysia Perlis. The Forum was attended by delegates from 68 institutions in 17 countries, and it was generally agreed that leaders of higher education in Asia should strive to promote programs aimed at developing multilingual competency, increasing understanding of cultural diversity, and nurturing creative abilities. The affiliation of ASP and AUPF was ratified to further the achievement of this goal. More information about the AUPF can be found at its main website and at the website for AUPF 2013 to be held at Universiti Malaysia Perlis.
